BOARD OF EDUCATIONS MINUTES TRANSCRIPTION (PARTIAL)

Preface

Many of the Minutes Books of the Clay County Board of Instruction have gathered dust on a shelf of some closet or another for more than a hundred years. Genealogists generally refer to censuses or military records or land grants for bits of information to extend their family trees – not realizing that the some of the branches are pre-bundled for them in the lists of students each parent is paying fees for. Historians consult ancient maps, surveys and deed books to determine where a settlement might have been located, or where an old building might be – not realizing that the secretaries of the School Board had easy-to-read cursive and had a knack for concisely saying which civic-minded citizen donated an acre of land for a school, which would bear the name of a settlement or the donor. Developers and county planners who want to be sensitive to the historical significance of a place, either to take advantage of it, or to preserve it, may not have any source of information to help them – not realizing that the School Board minutes tell the story of how the people were connected to their land, and creeks, and churches, and buildings.

So the Minutes Books provide important insight into the culture of the 19th and early 20th centuries. Opening to page one, we find the name of Ozias Budington, the first Superintendent. His name appears throughout our County's history. He was the head of a large family, a county judge, a merchant, a large landowner, an officer of an important railroad, a farmer and agricultural leader, a county clerk, a road commissioner and a county commissioner. Of all these roles, the Minute books of the School Board tell his story more than all of our other records. They describe projects he and the board members worked on, show who they interacted with, describe the issues they faced, and put flesh on the bones of statistics that raw censuses and land grant images simply can't do.

We love our children and the Minutes describe life for them as well. They show that parents were concerned about how far their children had to walk to school. They list the approved textbooks – all eleven of them. Our ancestors loved their children as well, ensuring that schools were placed within walking distance – say a mile and a half from each house – showing more precisely than a census can where people actually lived.

Nor are some community issues skirted. The School Board debates whether children whose parents pay higher fees should get a better education (no). The Minutes show whether school buildings were always available for black children (no) and whether black teachers got equal pay (no). Even in 1875, they reveal where all parents were satisfied with public education (no – some insisted on home schooling).

Perhaps surprising to us, even during the first year, trustees (parents) of a school had more flexibility in organizing the school when it met the standards set out by the School Board, and this flexibility was given by extending or withholding school financing.

We wish to thank Ben W_____, the Superintendent of Schools and _____ and _____ in the Superintendent's office for their providing access to the original records, workspace for the project, and gracious support throughout the effort. Thanks to _____ for reviewing drafts of the

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work, ensuring summaries were appropriate and errors were corrected. And thanks to the BCC for the wisdom to fund the publication of our work.

We present this transcription as a gift to the Citizens of Clay County and their ancestors. We hope you enjoy learning about the era when every school was a one-room school house and every teacher was a “Miss” Lizzie or Mattie – or a man, properly married. And we hope you discover something about your own family that helps you fill in the missing pieces or your ancestry.

How to use this information

This project is intended to give a flavor for the minutes by accurately transcribing word-for-word the first full year of meeting minutes.

Thereafter, the minutes are abbreviated to help the reader more quickly scan the material. Within this abbreviation, several items are left unwritten including rosters of meeting attendees, adjournment proceedings, signatures and other minor administrative matters. However, a summary all important business is provided, and a complete word-for-word transcription is included for the more important, or more unusual items.

The format of the minutes is quite similar to the original minutes, but they were, of course, in cursive in bound books. We have not made a rigorous effort to exactly reproduce where words are on the original pages, but have elected, rather, to format the transcription with page breaks, formatting and tables that make for the easiest reading.

If an exact original quote or precise formatting is important to your work, you might consider using this document as a finding aid to the original material.

If you happen to be electronically searching this document for a name and can't find it, consider consulting a master list of surnames in the Clay County Archives. The list will help you determine alternate spellings that could be helpful to you. There are dozens and dozens of names with alternate spellings, but the most often occurring ones are Borie-Boree, Buddington-Budington, Haas-Hass, Padgett-Padgett, and Silcox-Silcock-Silcocks. The many variations of Falana, Frisbee, Hogans, Houston, Mosely and Osteen are often spelled by these variants in the minutes.

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A note about the original Minutes Books

The original Minutes Books extend as far back as 1875 when the first School Board was organized. Unlike other county records which were mysteriously stolen when a county clerk left office, or landed in Black Creek when election results weren't to someone's liking, or didn't survive the transfer from Middleburg to the new county seat at Green Cove Springs, the Minutes Books survived intact at the Supervisor of Education's office.

At present, they are safe, both from mischief and the elements, in an air conditioned vault. They have fared fairly well over their first 130 years. The pages haven't suffered much deterioration and the ink is in general quite legible. The hardback bindings are not always in good shape, but the sewn interior bindings are still preventing pages from becoming detached and lost.

Some of the books are easier to read than others. Secretaries had wide ranges of script quality. In the first twenty pages, only three of four letters in thousands of words are indecipherable, and those could be deduced by consulting other public records. But later, unfortunately secretaries didn't take quite as much care, so even items of interest like lists of textbooks are difficult to make out.

Compared to other public records, they are second only to surveys in readability and condition and far more easy to read and use than deeds or colonial records.
